Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Recite and apply basic rules of English grammar.
- 2. List and define the seven parts of speech.
- 3. Identify the function of parts of speech in a sentence.
- 4. List the principal parts of a list of troublesome verbs.
- 5. Recite and apply the basic rules of capitalization and punctuation.
- 6. Write paragraphs with appropriate beginnings, endings, and supporting details/examples.
- 7. Write a well-constructed summary of a magazine/newspaper article.
- 8. Apply basic computer composition skills, including but not limited to Microsoft Word.
- 9. Perform basic APA documentation and citation skills.
- 10. Perform basic research skills, including note taking and outlining.
- 11. Learn the five-paragraph essay structure.
- 12. Write a critical analysis on the works of O. Henry with primary sources, in-text citations, and a well-documented source page.
- 13. Write a research essay of 500 words on an assigned topic complete with primary sources, in-text citations, and a well-documented source page.
