Course: 110 Art Appreciation

Credit: 4 quarter Hours Method of Delivery: eLearning

Course Description: A survey of the visual arts (painting, drawing, printmaking, sculpture and architecture) as they transmit cultural traditions and humanistic and aesthetic values. This course examines historical, social and technological factors that contribute to understanding the function and meaning of works of art.
