Course: HSM200 Billing and Reimbursement

Credit: 4 Quarter Hours

Method of Delivery: eLearning (E)

Course Description: This course exposes the student to government regulations and procedures for claims filed with Medicare, Medicaid, commercial and private health insurance; managed care systems, Worker's Compensation, and disability benefit programs. The student also learns fee schedule usage, claim-filing processes, tracing delinquent claims, computer/electronic filing, and completion of paper claims as well as diagnostic and procedural coding.

Prerequisite: AH110 and AH120 or equivalent.

- 7. Explain various costs that a patient may be responsible for paying using as explanation of benefits.

Academic Integrity:

This includes papers, computer programs, music, sculptures, paintings, photographs, etc. authored by another person without explicitly citing the original source(s). These actions violate the trust and honesty expected in academic work. Plagiarism is strictly against the academic policy of

Midstate College. Its seriousness requires a measured, forceful response which includes consequences for inappropriate and/or no citation.

In courses containing writing assignments, the College promotes the use of Turnitin which compares the student's writing against previously submitted papers, journals, periodicals, books, and web pages. Policies and Procedures:

- 1. Student must complete all work required by instructor.
