Course: JR250 Reporter Skill and Knowledge V

Credit: 4 Quarter Hours

Method of Delivery: eLearning, arranged (eL, arr.)

Course Description:

This course includes speedbuilding on literary, jury charge, two-voice and multivoice testimony. Vocabulary expansion, spelling skills, and cultural literacy topics are covered. Special emphasis is placed on speaker identification, fingerspelling, and QA shortcuts. Concurrent enrollment in JR251 Reporter Skill and Knowledge V Lab is required.

Topics:

Speaker identification, fingerspelling, QA shortcuts, reading and transcribing notes, speedbuilding, vocabulary expansion, spelling, concepts related to English literature, and politics.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. write a realtime translation theory for speaker identification, fingerspelling, and question and answer designation shortcuts.
- 2. read distinctly and with authority from steno outlines, quickly locating portions to be read and maintaining composure while reading.
- 3. transcribe steno outlines into English.
- 4. demonstrate knowledge of methods for building speed and accuracy on literary, jury charge, multi-voice, and two-voice testimony material.
- 5. match vocabulary words to their definitions.
- 6. recognize words that are spelled incorrectly.
- 7. identify concepts and terminology related to English literature and politics.
- 8. document job shadowing, mentoring, and peer review experiences.
