Weekly Summary: Each week you will present a brief report to the Weekly Summary Discussion Forum summarizing what you learned from the weekly course activities. Each weekly summary is due at the end of the week. For details

on this assignments, refer to the summary instructions, which are presented each week by the faculty member. Students will not be required to present a weekly summary for the first week of the course.

- 1. This course is taught from a lecture format with integrated discussion of examples and assignments. The student is encouraged to take an active role in the learning process. - 4. You will be compiling a Litigation Notebook (worth 100 points) throughout the 12 week term. Each week will be adding practical Tort Law information and/or documents to your Litigation Notebook. You must follow the outline provided by the Instructor and put relevant documents in the notebook throughout the term. This assignment in due in week 11 and it must be submitted electronically. No points will be added to your grade if assignments are not turned in. Points will be deducted (up to 50%) for homework assignments are turned in late (7-day late period), contain spelling/grammar errors, and/or are lacking in content/incomplete.
- 5. Late assignments will only be accepted up to 7 days after their due dates (for late credit). Any assignment turned in after this 7-day period expires will receive no credit.

Vocabulary quizzes cannot be taken late (they must be completed the week they are provided by the instructor). If you do not complete these quizzes (absent the week a quiz is given), 0 points will be added to your overall grade.

- 4. 200 Points Study Problems: There will be 20 Study Problem assignments throughout the term. Each Study Problem assignment is worth 10 points. Ten points will be deducted from your grade if assignments are not turned in. Five points will be deducted from your grade if assignments are turned in late, contain spelling/grammar errors, and/or are lacking in content (this applies if you submit a short/vague response to a weekly study problem). Late assignments will only be accepted up to 7 days after their due dates. Any assignment turned in after this 7-day period expires will receive no credit.
- 5. 80 Points Discussion Questions: There will be 8 Discussion Question assignments throughout the term. Each Discussion Question assignment is worth 10 points. You will need to submit your typewritten response (paragraph format) answering the Discussion Questions provided by the instructor. We will also discuss these questions in class. Ten points will be deducted from your grade if you do not submit your type written response to the instructor. Five points will be deducted from your grade if assignments are turned in late, contain spelling/grammar errors, and/or are lacking in content (this applies if you submit a short/vague response to a discussion question). Late assignments will only be accepted up to 7 days after their due dates. Any assignment turned in after this 7-day period expires will receive no credit.
- 6. 110 Points Weekly Summaries: There will be 11 Weekly Summary assignments throughout the term. Each Weekly Summary assignment is worth 10 points.
