- 1. Define basic ethical terminology and utilize it appropriately though critical reviews of text material.
- 2. Express a range of opinions and philosophies related to how one should arrive at ethical decisions.
- 3. Provide a framework of the relationships and relative value of such items as pleasure, truth, knowledge, and moral courage.
- 4. Apply humanitarian ethics to moral problems.
- 5. Analyze and present arguments for moral and ethical situations.
- 6. Support a personal ethical position as well as pinpoint fallacies when they may occur.

Midstate Plagiarism Policy:

portion of work for assignment credit. This includes papers, computer programs, music, sculptures, paintings, photographs, etc. authored by another person without explicitly citing the original source(s). These actions violate the trust and honesty expected in academic work. Plagiarism is strictly against the academic policy of Midstate College. Its seriousness requires a measured, forceful response which includes consequences for inappropriate and/or no citation.

In courses containing writing assignments, the College promotes the use of an electronic resource which compares the student's writing against previously submitted papers, journals, periodicals, books, and web pages. Students and instructors can use this service to reduce the incidence of plagiarism. This electronic resource has been found to conform to legal requirements for fair use and student confidentiality. It is able to provide a report to the student indicating the parts of the assignment that match.

Policies. Procedures and Requirements:

<u>Class discussions</u> - A student must post to the class discussion forum at least <u>three</u> times each week in order to be eligible for full <u>participation points</u>. Posts MUST be made on at least <u>two</u> different days for full points as well. These posts are designed to simulate class discussion and interaction, and will be worth 20% of the student's final grade. The topics each week will be directly related to the material being studied. The initial post should consist of 2 well-developed paragraphs and follow up posts should consist of at least <u>three sentences</u> in order for it to count as participation. Take note of your grammar as well. Excessive mistakes may result in a point deduction.

Online Discussions:

- Maintain "threads" by using the reply button rather than starting a new topic.
- Be polite. Choose your words carefully. Do not use derogatory statements. Be skeptical but respectful of each other's ideas.
- Be prepared to enter and respond to discussions each week.
- Be constructive in your comments and suggestions.

It is important that students review all the material each week for lecture content, assignments, expectations, etc. The syllabus is an overview, but it is essential that all weekly content be read, and assignments and discussion submitted or posted by the end of each week (Monday, 8am). I highly recommend posting to the discussion board throughout the week. New content and assignments will be loaded on the course's joule webpage by Noon on Mondays.

Late work will be accepted during the week it is due with a 10% penalty. After one week it will no longer be accepted unless arrangements have been made with me. After midterm, the beginning of week 7, I no longer accept late work from weeks 1-6.

Weekly Written Chapter Questions:

Weekly Questions must be answered with <u>at least 2</u> well-developed paragraphs (4-6 sentences each), unless otherwise stated. Each answer should highlight the focus points of the chapter. Do not copy and paste from the text, use your own words and your own examples.

Methods of evaluating student performance:

Project Information (more information will be supplied in the weekly folders):

Critical Review Papers (midterm paper):

Students will be required to write a critical review paper for this course. It will be at least 750 words in length and will require the student to analyze an ethical dilemma by applying the theories and concepts learned in the course by midterm. Students are welcome to promote whatever viewpoint or resolution they feel is right, but all sides of any argument must be analyzed in order to receive full points. The students will choose the ethical dilemma and get it approved by the instructor ahead of time or the paper will not be accepted.

Personal Theory Paper (final paper):

Students will also be required to write a 1000-word paper describing a comprehensive personal ethical theory that can be used as a guide in future ethical decision-making situations. This theory should be grounded in both personal beliefs and the ethical theories and principles studied during the course. Students will decide which theories they adhere to and supply examples from their lives, along with terms from the chapters, to describe how they did and will continue to make ethical decisions in their lives.

All written assignments will be graded taking the following into consideration:

- Comprehension your ability to communicate understanding of the materials from the text and online discussion.
- Argumentation how well you use examples and reasoning to "justify" your position. It is not
 sufficient simply to state your view; you must give adequate explanation or reason for it. Tell
 not only what, but why. Cite examples from the text or other readings you may have done to
 support your point of view.
- Clarity logic and cohesive development in presenting your position.
- Style how well the project, paper, communication is written to include proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation.

Examination Information:

There will be one multiple-choice and true/false exam covering chapters of the text. The exam will constitute 20% of the student's grade for the course.
